The changing face of BITES

What a difference a month makes! Sickness, non availability of cast, auditioning problems, they've all had an impact on the face of BITES but the great news is that the show goes on and that we will present eight nicely balanced short pieces.

Four monologues and four short plays now make up the program and some sixteen or so actors will be working for six directors.

We're promoting the show as crossing three continents and two centuries. We open with a guest appearance. Howard Stanley is making the trip from Bermagui to direct Anton Chekov's *On the Harmfulness of Tobacco*. Fear not, you'll not be lectured at, rather you'll be treated to a sneaky little expose of a middle class marriage in 19th Century Russia.

At the other end of the scale we have the premiere performance of *Cold* written by Jamie Forbes for the show. *Cold* takes us into a doctor's surgery to meet a group of patients very anxious to pass on their complaint.

This time she'll introduce some new cast members and In Theatre stalwarts Maddy Stocker and Niamh Nicol each have tongue in cheek monologues to offer. Diana Nicol will direct two of Nic's short plays, the award winning *Buying the Bag* and the premiere performance of *The Little Black Dress*

KLINGON ANYONE?


Non-Trekkies could be excused for wondering why but an opera staged entirely in the science fiction language has been staged in The Netherlands.

The Theatre has been open for two months and has never been dark. It's current show *Being Sellers* opens on November 2 and plays until November 19 before going straight to New York where it will play a three week season at *E59ETheatres*, *Brits off Broadway season*.


Canberra Theatre Centre currently has one out of the box. When The Rain Stops Falling has won all sorts of praise and awards

Alice Springs in the year 2039. A fish falls from the sky and lands at the feet of Gabriel York. It still smells of the sea. It's been raining for days and Gabriel knows something is wrong.

Eighty years earlier, his grandfather predicted that in 2039, fish would fall from the sky, heralding a great flood that would overcome the human race. When the Rain Stops Falling takes place between the worlds of these two men - between a prediction in 1959 and its outcome eighty years later.

When the Rain Stops Falling was the surprise theatrical hit of the 2008 Adelaide Festival and has gone on to win a swathe of awards including a 2008 South Australian Ruby Award for Best Work, two Adelaide Critics' Circle Awards, the Louis Esson Prize for Drama at the Victorian Premier's Literary Awards and the Queensland Premier's Literary Award for Drama Script.

Narooma Kinema is scheduling the full list of the UK's National Theatre Live program. You've just missed Complicite's production of A Disappearing Number but you're in plenty of time for Hamlet scheduled for January 15 and 16 and directed by the National's Nicholas Hytner. Narooma is one of only four spots in regional NSW we'll be able to see it.
